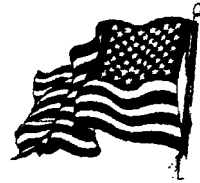



### **Report and Recommendations**

**Gainesville.** The 2003-4 chapter officers were sworn in on Feb. 17, 2003 by FLSSAR Senior VP Larry Bradley. The new officers are H. Bariteau (Pres.), G. Greenwood (1<sup>st</sup> VP), R. Davis (2<sup>nd</sup> VP), H. Bariteau (Sec. Pro Tem), C. Rinek (Treas.), H. Hollien (Regist.), J. Partin (Geneal.), C. Rinek (Chaplain), S. Boone (Chancellor), W. Page (Hist.), W.S. Gordon (Sgt.-Arms), H. Hollien (Color Guard Cdr.). The three speakers for this quarter were Robert Murphy (“On Vetspace”), Larry Bradley (The SAR Emblem and its Meaning) and Frank Hodalski (Multiculturalism) respectively.

**Lake City.** The Lake City Liberty Tree project is still on hold. This chapter has not been very active except in the area of recruiting.

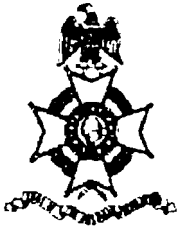
**Lake-Sumter.** This chapter meets the first Saturday of each month except during the Summer quarter. Their speakers/programs were as follows: January -- Lt. Charles Johnson spoke on “The Emergency Medical Services for Lake and Sumter Counties”; February — James Gregg spoke on his pilot training for WWII B-24 Bombers and his experiences when flying 35 missions, and March — Chuck White spoke on “Memory”. 

**CALOOSA:** February being Presidents Month there was no better time to honor our first President and Revolutionary War hero George Washington. The General turned down the chance to be king to be our first President, the world's first. Also, this month Compatriot Dick Jordan showed a video of the recent renovation of the Washington Monument that was erected in his honor. Our March program was a happy story of Pearl Harbor. Our guest speakers Monica and Bernie Benning, who were stationed at the Pearl gave a first hand account of the historical events. Our annual big event was our ROTC awards ceremony. 

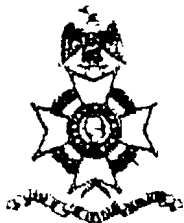

1. Regretfully Alvie Davidson has had to withdraw from the committee but we are blessed by the addition of

Phil Ballou and Hal Miller. We also believe that William Boe will accept our invitation to be a formal consultant to the committee.

2. We now have an e-mail "servers" list. Any Compatriot who wishes to stay current with this committee has only to contact the chair at hollien@grove.ufl.edu.

3. The "Textbook" Program. This thrust is headed by David Ramseur ably assisted by new member Phillip

Ballou. It was almost a year ago now that David recommended we set up a program wherein interested

FLSSAR compatriots would be urged to volunteer for service on local/state Social Studies textbook

committees. In the interim, he investigated (see below) the process necessary for doing so. As it turns out, Bill Boe also advised us to act along these lines. He suggested that we utilize Gov. Bush's membership in the SAR by going directly to him re: having

one of our members appointed to the State textbook committee. This approach (or a similar one) may be crucial because there are only a few slots on the committee for "lay" members. Second, David recently took direct action along these lines. Since he already is an invited judge for the NE Regional Science Fairs, he has contact with the Science Specialist for the Florida Department of

Education (FDE). He wrote her suggesting that the State textbook committee consider appointing one of our members to the Social Sciences Committee. She indicated that she had contacted the appropriate person and suggested that he, in turn, contact us. David and Phil are now 1) researching the structure, nature, etc. of the

State textbook committees, obtaining relevant forms (applications, etc.) and routes to membership, 2) exploring our contacts (for these purposes) with the Governor and other relevant state officials, and 3) identifying the county/local textbook adoption committees and, if possible, determining routes to their membership.

4. The "Legislative Thrust". This team is made up of Bob Liebler and new committee member Hal Miller.

Progress is being made here also. Last year Bob started out by actually visiting a number of schools. He indicated that he found the American History textbooks reasonably acceptable but was dismayed to find no American History requirements existing at the High School level. He also discovered that very few U.S. Universities require a course in American History for graduation. Based on his research and experience, he has come to the conclusion that a one-semester course in Early American History

(Colonial period to Civil War) should be mandatory for graduation from High School. He later upgraded this position by indicating that he felt that Colonial/American History ALSO should be made a requirement for the awarding of the Bachelors Degree at all Florida State Universities. He thereby proposes that we attempt to contact each of our State Representatives and Senators in order to obtain 1) their (relevant) input, 2) their endorsement and 3) their support in writing/passing legislation designed to correct the cited problem. He also suggests that we should call it History (not Social Sciences) and he wonders if we might have better success in having legislators attach their bill (as an ammendment) to other legislation. Finally, he also is in favor of a "grass roots" thrust which would focus on ammending the Florida Constitution for purposes of insuring that History will continue to be taught. Bob has been talking to Legislators in order to become familiar with how bills can be introduced and how "riders" work. We certainly agree with this philosophy/thrust. Moreover, Bill Boe has suggested that we collaborate with Veteran's groups and other patriotic societies so we can enhance our efforts.

5. The "In the Schools" Program. Saul Montes-Bradley and I have been contacting and visiting schools for the purpose of determining ways that FLSSAR can upgrade our effect on them. We now are trying to organize numerous elements into a single program. They include: 1) the many suggestions we are receiving from Compatriots and others (especially those from consultant Boe), 2) the types/sources of materials (especially structured materials and relevant posters), 3) how contacts are made, invitations generated and 4) the nature of the actual teaching outlines/materials. Of especial importance here are the "all levels" CD being provided by NSSAR (as developed by the Texas Society in collaboration with the Heritage Foundation).

6. We are still seeking additional members for this committee.

The following is the Spring/Annual 2003 quarterly report for the FLSSAR Electronics Technology Committee.

E-mail lists have been sent to all FLSSAR members on that list, and are not otherwise published. There are currently approximately 250 members listed on that list.

A tool for measuring the performance of the FLSSAR website was put to use over a year ago. It is the Website Tracking report which has the ability to measure activity on our website. Last year we were using a special price of \$60.00 per year. The price now is \$120 per year for the full package. For the time being we are using the "free" version which can help us to measure daily "hits" but does not allow for aggregate reports or any reports for the previous day. This list has been extremely helpful in formulating strategies that will give us "more bang for the buck" on our website.

The Spring 2003 issue of "The Florida Patriot" is now online. It is the third issue to be put online where it can be shared with other State Societies or anyone interested in the SAR. It has sound and color and can carry additional information that is too voluminous for the printed version. A "Compatriot's Computer Corner has been added on page 5 which is dedicated to helping novice and intermediate viewers enhance their computer skills. Members have been asked to contribute to future columns.

We are currently adding about thirty newsletters per quarter and 12 photo gallery pages along with the twenty page "Florida Patriot." This equates to over 100 pages per quarter with hundreds of photos and

links to many interesting websites.

Our daily volume continues to grow and currently averages over 350 hits per day with over 170 individual viewers daily. We provide BOM Meeting information on the website and in the internet version of "The Florida Patriot."

Each chapter has its own distinct web page on the Florida Society website, and two chapters now have their own web page (Gainesville and Miami chapters). All chapters are encouraged to develop their own websites and have been offered help in doing so.

Spring 2003 BOM  
Report

Over the past quarter, I have met with numerous representatives of lineage societies and community organizations as well as council members of the cities of Coral Gables, Miami and North Miami Beach.

It has become apparent that the best way to organize a drive to build a suitable memorial to President George Washington in the Dade County area will be to establish a foundation, the George Washington Memorial Foundation, register it as a 501 (c) (3) corporation under IRS rules, and develop a project to be presented to the various municipalities in Dade Co.

The need to establish the GWMF as a 501 (c) (3) stems from the need to raise appropriate funds for the development of the project itself, for which the tax-exempt status is, if not indispensable, highly conducive.

It can be argued that several of the participating societies already hold the status, but that would necessarily mean that the project would become that society's instead of the broad based effort that would seem to have the better chances for success.

All societies contributing to initially fund the Foundation within its first year would become "Charter Members", and be entitled to have one Trustee at the foundation's board. It is suggested that this Charter Member contribution be set at \$ 1,000.00. This Board of Trustees will be the governing body of the Foundation.

The first step to be taken by the Foundation will be to call on area sculptors and builders to present projects and estimates. The Board of Trustees of the foundation will then decide by 21 February 2004, which project will be sponsored and it will then be presented to the several towns. The Board of Trustees will then select the location from the options then available.


The Miami Chapter FLSSAR has already voted to support the GWMF. Coconut Grove Lodge No. 258, F&AM will vote on 04 May, followed by the Master's and Warden's Association of Dade County on 12 May. On 13 May, it will be presented to the Coral Gables DAR and, through the end of the month, it will be put to consideration by the Coral Gables Rotary, the Scottish Rite Bodies of Miami and Sons of the Revolution in Florida. There are numerous other organizations that have shown interest.

Articles of Incorporation are being drawn with assistance from John Thompson, esq., past President of the Miami Chapter and David Mitchell, esq., 1<sup>st</sup> Vice-President of the Miami Chapter, both attorneys with successful practice in Coral Gables.

These Articles will be forwarded to supporting organizations for approval and funding prior to filing. The first board of trustees will then adopt the by-laws of the foundation.

The committee recommends approval of a motion to support the George Washington Memorial Foundation pending review of the Articles of Incorporation and recommends that three members of the board be assigned its review.

The period of this report is from 19 January through 3 May 2003. A number of the Camps participated in civic patriotic ceremonies in their areas, joined with DAR Chapters in celebrating George Washington's birthday; and conducted patriotic, historical, or educational presentations before various fraternal, civic and business groups. 13. Engraving Expenses not to exceed \$5.00 per award.
14. Liberty Tree - not to exceed \$250.00 on a one time only basis.

4. Any application for eligible reimbursement in excess of \$350.00 shall be submitted by the Disbursement Committee to the next FLSSAR BOM meeting for disposition.

#### **THE FOLLOWING ARE NOT REIMBURSABLE EXPENSES**

1. Any administrative expenses: postage, telephone, correspondence, etc.
2. Frames or framing other than SAR presentation folders.
3. Any award or medal to SAR members.
4. Any expenses for awards in previous or future calendar years.
5. Cost of meals for other than award recipients, except as in Rumbaugh and Knight contests.
6. Any awards to animals.

#### **THE FOLLOWING MUST BE APPROVED BY THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT**

1. Reimbursement expenses in excess of \$350.00.
2. Reimbursement for requests by one Chapter in excess of six in any calendar year.
3. Requests for projects other than those listed above under **AUTHORIZED REIMBURSEMENTS**.
